Dear Friends.

Easter seemed to come around so quickly this year, it was quite a surprise, I'm sure someone has speeded up time! No sooner than the Nativity Figure went away we had Lent! I hope you had a good Lent? Perhaps you did something different?

Talking of surprises the empty tomb must have come as a surprise to Mary and the first disciples. Without reaction to the resurrection? the belief in the resurrection the Christian faith could not have come into being. The disciples would have remained crushed and defeated men Even had they continued to remember Jesus as their beloved teacher, his crucifixion would have forever silenced any hopes of his being the Messiah. The cross would have remained the sad and shameful end of his career. Not that we go around with an inane grin on our faces, but that our lives are transformed by the joy that the knowledge of the resurrection brings to those who truly believe in the One who rose from the dead. We need to have that same joy that caused Mary to run and tell all that "He is Risen!".

Welcome for New Pope

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have offered their warmest welcome to the election of Cardinal Bergoglio as the successor to His Holiness Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

Archbishop Justin said, "We wish Pope Francis every blessing in the enormous responsibilities that he has assumed on behalf of Roman Catholics around the world.



"His election is also of great significance to Christians everywhere, not least among Anglicans. We have long since recognised - and often reaffirmed - that our churches hold a special place for one another. I look forward to meeting Pope Francis, and to walking and working together to build on the consistent legacy of our predecessors. May the love of Christ unite us, and intensify our service in a genuine and fruitful ecumenism that can be a blessing for the Body of Christ throughout the world.

"Pope Francis is well known as a compassionate pastor of real stature who has served the poor in Latin America, and whose simplicity and holiness of life is remarkable. He is an evangelist, sharing the love of Christ which he himself knows. His choice of the name Francis suggests that he wants to call us all back to the



transformation that St Francis knew and brought to the whole of Europe, fired by contemplation and closeness to God."

Archbishop Sentamu tweeted, "Praying for Pope Francis. Like St Francis of Assisi, I pray he'll be an instrument of peace and preach the Gospel - use words if he must".

On 21st March the Archbishop's public ministry will be inaugurated at Canterbury Cathedral. Did you know: The last time the Pope and Archbishop of Canterbury were enthroned so closely together was in 1294, when they were two weeks apart!

Why Girlguiding should keep God in its promise



A majority of girls and young women recently surveyed by Girlguiding UK say they believe in a god. As the organisation's open consultation on the Promises made by new members drew to a close in March, a senior

Church of England priest said it is important that the promise to "love God", retains its place. 70% of 7-11 year olds believe in 'a god', according to the survey of 1,200 7-21 year olds in the UK, conducted by Girlguiding UK. The figure for 11-21 year olds is 55%.

"Girlguiding UK has always been an organisation that has held the spiritual development of girls at the heart of its activities," says Canon Sheila Bamber of Sunderland Minster and a former Faith Adviser for Girlguiding UK. "In a society where it is increasingly 'uncool' for young people to believe in God or any 'higher power', it is important that there are still places where they can be encouraged to explore and develop their own beliefs."

Watch Les Miserables to learn of God's grace and redemption

Watching the film Les Miserables is an ideal way to learn of God's grace, redemption and mercy, says the priest-in-charge of St Mary the Virgin, Ewelme, in Oxfordshire, where one of the film's most important scenes was filmed.

The Revd Jonathan Meyer recalls: "It was almost a year ago that I was approached and asked about filming part of Les Miserables in the church at Ewelme. Filming took place on 21st March, when the south porch was transformed into the residence of the Bishop of Digne. The convict Jean Valjean emerges from the door, singing the words 'and now let the story begin'.

"We saw this on a crisp March day, repeated over and over again with numerous cameras, film crews, lights, gantries and a churchyard full of sound technicians. On screen we saw the contorted face of Valjean rushing forward, and the camera showing us our church digitised on to a promontory in Provence.

"Most important to me was that this is the nub of the film. The Bishop's act of kindness, like the grace of God, is poured out in such a way that Valjean's life is transformed and transforms others."
