Dear Friends,

How are you all coping with the unusually hot weather we are blessed with (or not so blessed) at the moment? I'm one that finds this prolonged hot weather uncomfortable, during cold weather you can at least add more warm clothes but in hot weather there is a limit to what you can take off.

However, there is of course a good reason for the changes in the weather, I'm not going down the global warming path just simply thinking of the seasons, Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter. Each season has its ups and downs, its very own reason for being, its meaning and its beauty, each is vital to the wellbeing of God's creation.

The creation depends upon the seasons for its balance and its health and being part of the creation so do we. We all rely upon the differing seasons and what they each bring for our health and our life.

Thinking of this just this week caused me to think of the church year, of its seasons, why we have them and what they each mean.

The Christian Church year focuses on the life and ministry of Jesus. The sequence of festivals from Advent to Resurrection Sunday becomes an annual spiritual journey for worshippers as they kneel at the manger, listen on a hillside, walk the streets of Jerusalem, hear the roar of

the mob, stand beneath the cross, and witness the resurrection!

The rest of the church year provides opportunity to reflect on the meaning of the coming of Jesus and his commission to his people to be a light to the world.

As a congregation moves through the church calendar, they are presented in an organized way with the opportunity to talk about, reflect upon, and respond to the entire range of truths that lie at the heart of the Christian Faith.

The Christian calendar is organized around **Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, and Easter**, concluding at **Pentecost**.

The rest of the year following Pentecost is known as **Ordinary Time** or Trinity.

Ordinary Time is used to focus on various aspects of the Faith, especially the mission of the church in the world. It is the longest of our seasons it is often regarded as the boring time and as it coincides with the summer season it's when everyone takes their holidays.

But as I said earlier all seasons are just as important as any other, this season of Ordinary time or Trinity is just as important to our faith and worship as Christmas or Easter.

I pray that you all have a good holiday season while still thinking of your spiritual wellbeing and return safe and sound.

Inspirational Crewe teenager receives award after raising over £5,000 for Diabetes UK

A teenager from Crewe has received an award from Diabetes UK after raising funds to support diabetes research.

Emma Horne, 16, received the 'Young Person's Outstanding Contribution Award' during a service at St Mary's Wistaston on Wednesday 11 July 2018.

The Malbank High School and Sixth Form College pupil raised £5,100 for Diabetes UK during her year as Wistaston's Rose Queen, and chose to support the charity because she has friends and family with Type 1 diabetes including her sister, Laura, and her dad, Michael, who recently found out he has Type 2 diabetes.



Emma said: "I am proud to re-

ceive this award and would like to dedicate it to the congregation at St Mary's Church, Wistaston, who supported me through my year as Rose Queen and made it possible to raise such a fantastic amount of money."

Her fundraising events included tea dances, a onesie party, plant sales, Christmas fairs, a Chinese New Year-themed quiz, and a 2018 calendar featuring photographs from the events.

The money was donated to a diabetes research project being undertaken at The University of Manchester by Dr Jenny Myers, which is monitoring mothers-to-be with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes and their unborn babies. In women with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes, their babies can grow too small or too large during pregnancy, and this is thought to be linked to the mother's blood glucose levels.

Emma added: "It was important for me to support Diabetes UK, and particularly this research, as my sister Laura has Type 1 diabetes and gave birth to a baby boy, Perran William Isaac, in September 2017."

Trevor Fudger, Diabetes UK Regional Fundraiser said: "It's an honour to be able to present Emma with this award, and we are extremely grateful for all her hard work and the support of all those involved in her fundraising efforts. It has made a huge difference to people with diabetes and to our work to create a world where diabetes can do no harm."

My Journey so far, by Jayne Manfredi

For those of you who haven't encountered me yet, or have wondered who I am, this article is my opportunity to introduce myself and say hello. I'm Jayne, an Ordinand, soon to be training to be a Priest at Queens Theology College in Birmingham. I can be found most Sunday's at St Mary's, with my four children and my husband Leo.



Answering a call to be ordained is a confusing and bewildering experience! I became a Christian in 2012, rather suddenly after a lifetime of non-belief. I wouldn't describe it as a Damascene experience, but rather a Road to Emmaus conversion; just like the unobservant disciples, I came to realise that God had actually been with me all the time. I joined a church and after a year or so my Vicar suggested – tentatively – that I might be called to ordained ministry, a suggestion that at the time I balked at. Be a priest...me? It was a strange and unwelcome thought.

What followed was a period of discernment where I tried to work out my calling with help from Reverend Magdalen Smith – the Diocesan Director of Ordinands. Her help, support and unwavering determination that I had a strong calling to ordained ministry helped convince me that perhaps it was worth pursuing.

I also enrolled on the Foundations for Ministry course, run by Chester Diocese. This runs from September to May, and has the option for accredited written work which can be carried forward toward further study. There is no pressure to undertake the written work, so that needn't be a barrier for people who might feel intimidated by essays.

It's a great starting point for anyone wanting to explore the potential shape of their own calling, and an opportunity to ask the question: how does God want me to serve? Does he want me to step out into a ministry that I've never thought of before, such as a pastoral worker? Should I remain in children's ministry? Is God prompting me to explore reader ministry? The FFM course will give you an excellent springboard to help answer these questions.

It's also an opportunity to share fellowship with different people from the diocese and learn about their church traditions. Our group formed a close bond with one another and it was great to have each other's support as we progressed throughout the course, which is grounded in prayer and worship. I can't recommend it highly enough, so if you think this is something you'd be interested in, see Rev. Mike for details or check out the Chester Diocese website. I'm also happy to chat and answer any questions.
