An invitation to you this Christmastime to "Follow the Star"!

#FollowTheStar

Once again this year the Church of England theme for the Christmas advertising campaign is "Follow the Star" and the hashtag for social media will be #FollowtheStar.

It's a very simple concept which obviously draws upon the traditional story of the three kings journey to find the new born baby Jesus and it's one that is relevant to us today. It may not be that we actually follow a star these days, but hopefully there are other things that draw us to worship Jesus this year. Perhaps you are a regular at church and it will be part of your usual routine. Or maybe you always go to church at Christmastime. maybe attracted by the carols or the nativity. It could be that you haven't been in a church for many years, or never at all,

but feel that you would like to find out more about Christmas. Jesus and just what all the fuss was about on that first Christmas Day and what caused people to follow a star. #### Tools with a Mission

Do you have a garage/shed full of items to be sorted when you get 'a round tuit'? I do! Often the barrier to progress is where to send the items. Clothing, accessories, books, games - charity shops are always grateful for donations of clean, good quality stock. But what do you do with that old printer, the sewing/ knitting machine you no longer use, the power tools whose owner has gone to be with the Lord, the gardening tools that are sadly redundant, even those bits and pieces which end up in a box - allen keys,tyre pressure gauges, screwdrivers, computer cables and the list goes on.

Tools With A Mission is a charity based in Ipswich which launched in 1984 and registered as a charity in 1999. We collect many sorts of tools and larger machinery, refurbish them and ship them in containers from Harwich to countries such as DR Congo, Uganda and Zambia.

Organisations/small groups of local people based in these countries apply to TWAM for the equipment they need to run self-supporting projects. For example, Neboth was to be named Naboth, after the biblical character, but his parents couldn't read or write and his name was spelled wrong. Neboth educated himself then decided to do the same for the children of his village. His school uses online learning to educate local orphans or vulnerable children, but when he started out, he faced poverty and a lack of resources to run the two roomed school in Zambia.

Tools With A Mission stepped in, and with the help of several dedicated local volunteers, the school is up and running. Hansuma is a Military Policeman and also a carpenter. He uses his skills and tools provided by TWAM to make all the school furniture, as well as other furniture to sell on behalf as the school to raise funds. Annin is a tailor who uses a TWAM supplied sewing machine to make all the school uniforms in the mornings. Afternoons are for teaching the children's parents so that they, too, can learn to tailor and sell clothes to raise a family income. In the evening she makes clothes she can sell to support the school. She even trains the teachers to make clothes for themselves and to sell to supplement their poor wages.

Neboth, Hansuma and Annin support the whole school and its six poorly- and rarely-paid teachers. But this story of success would not exist without the provision of TWAM carpentry kits, sewing machines and computer equipment. There are and could be many more stories of inspirational projects, but none of this can be done without support from TWAM. So, if you find yourself inspired by Neboth's tale, how can you help?

TWAM are looking for local tool collectors, speakers who will help us get the word out, and of course, donors of tools/equipment. I became involved when my Dad passed away and Mum was worrying about how to clear the garage of his motor mechanic tools. In the aftermath of bereavement, things like this can become huge worries. Relocation/downsizing can lead to smaller accommodation which lacks space; ill health can mean people are no longer physically able to do DIY or gardening. /contd......(pg 5)

As the tools are refurbished, TWAM has several sites where this is done. A van collects from local collectors and takes tools to the nearest refurbishment centre. All this costs money, even though the vast majority of people who work for TWAM are volunteers (myself included). It costs around £20,000 to refurbish, send and distribute a container of tools/ equipment to Africa. Would you like to make a donation towards our costs or consider leaving a legacy in your will?

Finally, as a Christian charity, we believe in the power of prayer. Please remember us in your prayers, pray for wisdom for the charity leaders and that the right people come forward to volunteer with us; pray for donations of good-quality tools which can be refurbished and donations, no matter how small, which will help us continue our work helping people in the UK and Africa.
