Alleluia, Christ is Risen. He is Risen indeed, alleluia!

A Happy and Joyful Easter to you and your loved ones this Eastertide.

ancient Easter Acclamation above has been used by Christians for centuries to greet each other and is still used at the beginning of services during the Easter season. At one time, it would have been a common greeting that Christians used when they met each other and has now become a part of the Easter liturgy. This ancient phrase echoes the greeting of the angel to Mary Magdalene and the other Mary as they arrived at the tomb to anoint the body of Jesus: "He is not here; for he has risen, as he said" (Matt 28:6).

The excitement of that first encounter with the Risen Jesus has continued through the centuries and Christians in every age have proclaimed it and kept the message alive, Christ is Risen!

The reason for this is to ensure the message of the Risen Christ is made known to this and future generations so as they may join in and experience for themselves the life transforming gift of the Risen



Jesus. After all, why wouldn't you want to pass on good news to others? It's a natural thing to want to do. If we have a good meal in a restaurant (remember those times!), or we've had good service from a company or an individual, we quite naturally want to share that with other people, so that they can have the same experience.

The same is true of the Christian message, of the resurrection, of our personal experience of the Risen Jesus, we should want to share it. Times are difficult at the moment and it's not easy to share things with other people in a meaningful way, however, let's keep the message of the Risen Jesus in our minds through this Easter season (ends 16 May) and look for opportunities to let others know the difference that the Risen Jesus has made in our lives.

First Reading: Acts 10.34-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

This is the Word of the Lord.

Gospel Reading: Mark 11.1–11

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. **Glory to you O Lord.**

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
