The Season of Trinity

We have just begun the longest season in the church's calendar and that is Trinity. It takes us, this year, all the way through to 24 October with 21 Sundays of Trinity. It also referred to as Ordinary Time, however there's nothing ordinary about it.

On the front cover is Reblev's Icon of the Trinity. It's a famous depiction of the Holy Trinity, the Godhead, three persons in one. At the time of Rublev, the Holy Trinity was the embodiment of spiritual unity, peace, harmony, mutual love and humility. Many sermons have tried to explain the Trinity over the centuries and I'm not going to try to do that in the space

What strikes me about the Trinity and its workings, and the world we find ourselves in at the moment, is the interdependence of the Persons of the Trinity and how, through the pandemic, we have understood more about our interdependence with each other in this world. Perhaps the model of the Trinity, as difficult as it may be for us to fathom, gives us a pattern for shared life together which we may have lost through the years?

Gospel Reading: Mark 3.20-35

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. **Glory to you O Lord.**

Then Jesus entered a house, and again a crowd gathered, so that he and his disciples were not even able to eat. When his family heard about this, they went to take charge of him, for they said, 'He is out of his mind.'

And the teachers of the law who came down from Jerusalem said, 'He is possessed by Beelzebul! By the prince of demons he is driving out demons.'

So Jesus called them over to him and began to speak to them in parables: 'How can Satan drive out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand. And if Satan opposes himself and is divided, he cannot stand; his end has come. In fact, no one can enter a strong man's house without first tying him up. Then he can plunder the strong man's house. Truly I tell you, people can be forgiven all their sins and every slander they utter, but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will never be forgiven; they are guilty of an eternal sin.'

He said this because they were saying, 'He has an impure spirit.'

Then Jesus' mother and brothers arrived. Standing outside, they sent someone in to call him. A crowd was sitting round him, and they told him, 'Your mother and brothers are outside looking for you.'

'Who are my mother and my brothers?' he asked.

Then he looked at those seated in a circle round him and said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers! Whoever does God's will is my brother and sister and mother.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
