Mike writes... August 2017



On 6 August the church celebrates the Transfiguration (Luke 9.28-36) - this year it happens to be a Sunday. It's an event which shows the glory of Jesus in this world. It links Jesus to the past, Moses and Elijah, and perhaps more importantly for us, associates him with the present and the future.

The Transfiguration is not an easy concept for us to understand – it is one of those occurrences that is out of the normal register of our mind. It is something that we struggle with because we have no experience to liken it with – or do we? Most Christians have a point in their lives when they may have sensed the presence of Jesus with them in a real and tangible way – a time of trouble, a time of sorrow, a time of joy, a time when you could actually feel that Jesus was there with you in your situation, helping, guiding, being. A point when Jesus' glory shines into our lives and makes a difference.

The Transfiguration is hallmarked by the change of Jesus' appearance – Luke tells us, "As Jesus was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning." – a visible

sign of Jesus' glory and power in this world. Although, as we know, it did not guarantee an easy life for Jesus whilst in this world, and for the world, whilst giving hope, it did not bring an end to strife. Following the terrorist events of this year in our own country we are reminded of this.

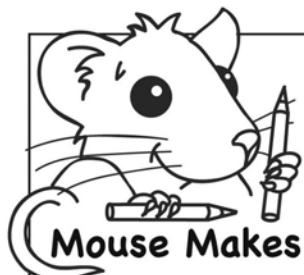
Another "bright light" happened on an August 6th which bears testament to this. This particular "bright light" killed an estimated 140,000 people with hundreds of thousands more casualties – it was, of course the dropping of the Atom Bomb on Hiroshima, which, along with the bombing of Nagasaki, brought to an end the 2nd World War. This "bright light" came after 6 years of war and the loss of countless lives. The A Bombs (rightly or wrongly used?) brought to an end a chapter of humankind's inhumanity towards each other. Sadly, as we know, many more chapters have been written since.

This is the world we live in; with this tremendous juxtaposition of God's glory through his Son Jesus and the inability for humankind to live in peace with each other. Perhaps this August 6th you may wish to offer a prayer for peace in this world.

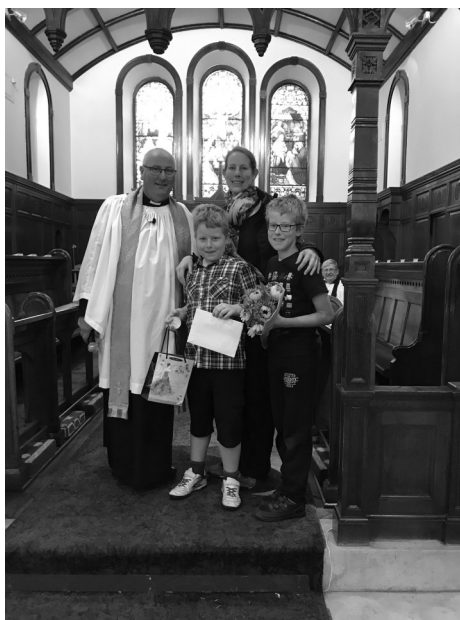
Junior Church News

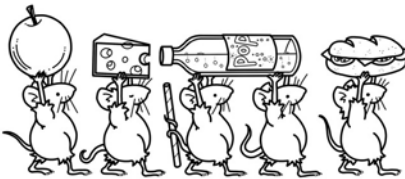
