# Mike writes... October 2016



### Dear friends,

Week after week, a man went to his vicar with a big problem. He said, "When I go to bed, I can't sleep because I'm afraid of monsters under my bed. I know it's silly, but I just can't help it."

Over the following weeks the vicar recommended prayer, reading the Bible, singing hymns, keeping the lights on, but nothing worked. Then, one Sunday the man came to church happy and well rested. He told the vicar that he got help from his friend the carpenter. The vicar asked, "What did the carpenter tell you to do?" The man said, "He told me just to cut the legs off my bed!"

Sometimes the problems we encounter are easily solved, some are not. Sometimes, as above, there is a practical solution to our problems, sometimes not. There are many times in life when we don't know where to turn and who to seek help from.

Through the years I've found help in the Bible. One book in particular, Psalms, seems to reach through the centuries and speak into our lives today. Did you know that the Israelites would sing Psalms while making their yearly pilgrimage to worship in the temple in Jerusalem? For

many, this was a long and treacherous trip. The miles were long and the traveller was vulnerable. There were dangers that awaited them on many fronts. There were many things that could go wrong, many bad things that could happen. So, they would sing Psalms to strengthen them and give them courage.. One in particular, Psalm 121, was written to remind God's people as to how He protects them in times of danger.

The first verse is, 'I lift up my eyes to the hills, where does my help come from?' As a traveller in a dangerous situation, it could be that you lift your eyes to the hills as this is where danger may come from, an attack from high ground on those in the valley below. Or it could be that you lift your eyes to the hills as this is what reminds you of God, of the times when he connected with your ancestors as through Moses. Either could be correct... However the reply in the 2nd verse is unequivocal: 'My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth'. There is no doubt in this statement. This can only come from knowing God through scripture and walking with him daily.

Why not take those two verses into your mind and dwell on them for a few days.

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### A day in the life of Ann Stubbs.....



Or Jane Ann as she is known at Richmond Village in Nantwich! Ann kindly showed me around the Village which also includes Care Homes. The oldest resident is Lena who is 103 years young! There are about 100 residents within Richmond Village and Ann and her team of Hannah & Linda arrange the activities. Ann's title is Activities Organiser. She has worked there for 5 years. There are activities organised every day, in the morning and

afternoons and sometimes in the evenings. There are outings organised as well and they are shortly due to go to Chester Zoo. Christmas shopping trips will also be planned. Ann is also licenced to drive the mini buses so it is certainly a very busy role! The social activities are also very varied, giving people a choice of what they want to do or join in with. Examples are guizzes, crosswords, art groups, speakers. I met with one lovely lady Pam, in her apartment and she printed me an example of a quiz (always useful). Pam also does talks herself, health permitting - a very interesting lady. She was also looking after Sally the dog who belongs to a member of staff. Sally stays with Pam during

the day to keep her company. I also met with Margaret Wooldridge and others over morning coffee. Ann had been on holiday and they were very pleased to see her back - a popular lady! Margaret showed me the previous week's activities programme and which ones she had chosen to attend, so there is something for everyone. Most of you know Margaret through St Mary's and Margaret says she really enjoys living there. She has her own apartment and has made



many friends. Margaret is pictured with Ann and other ladies from the coffee morning.

Ann says they also do fundraising, for example Alzheimers and she will be participating in a walk, together with others from the home who are still fit and active. Other fundraising events have included Cocktails event and Skydiving!!! There is a Sunday service every week with Holy Communion. Also, on the 4th Sunday of every month there is a get-together with Revd Barry Wilson at 3pm. This is 'a chance to enjoy friendly company and a chat over a cup of tea or coffee with homemade cake, a programme of activities and a short talk'. Ann says everyone is welcome to come and join them for this social - especially if you are looking for something to do on a Sunday afternoon.

I was made to feel very welcome and residents and staff were very friendly. A big thank you to Ann (Jane Ann!) and Margaret for letting me have some insight into what goes on at Richmond Village. Sue

#### Cambodia 2016

Going away for a month to a country half way across the world with a group of people you barely know is about the biggest thing most of us have done. As you would expect this comes with a few hurdles to get over. It would be difficult enough in a westernised country but in a developing country with a completely different environment it can be really tough. Almost everyone suffered from traveller's



diarrhoea or other minor issues at some point during the trip which meant people running to the toilet was not an unusual sight. People running out of toilets was pretty common too thanks to the ever present spiders and insects.



Despite all this, it has been without doubt the best thing we have ever done. Every day there was something incredible to experience. The highlights of the trip were definitely going into the schools to teach and spend time with local kids, their energy is inspiring as well as the breath-taking views we found around every corner.

Even on a normal project day, the

sense of family within the group and the non-stop laughs made it almost impossible to feel down, regardless of the extreme heat and tiredness. There hasn't been a single day that didn't feel like it improved us as people. From the sense of achievement on project, to the astounding attitudes of the local people and how much they appreciated the work, especially with the heart-breaking stories of S21 Security Prison and the Killing Fields, we both feel as though we have grown in a way we never could have expected. Neither of us

regret a single moment of our journey with Camps, we'd do it again in a heartbeat.
