### **Remembering In November - Rev Paul**

If you are driving or walking through Wistaston you can't help but notice the incredible ribbon of poppies installation that St Mary's are honoured to be hosting. The 35<sup>th</sup> South West Cheshire (Wistaston) Scout Group have made the most wonderful display to remember the fallen and raise funds for The Royal British Legion on their 100<sup>th</sup> year. A great deal of dedicated work has gone in to producing such a moving act of remembrance.

During November, as a church, we remember those we have loved and see no more in various services. Remembrance Sunday is of course central to this. In addition to this on November the 1<sup>st</sup> we celebrate All Saints Day, where we remember those who have gone before. Those famous saints who led the church through teaching and worship, the likes of St Peter, St Paul, St Mary, and St Luke. Those whose faithfulness was unwavering. And we remember those who have journeyed with us personally guiding us in our faith. At the beginning of November, we also remember those who we

miss personally, those people who have departed this life during the preceding year. We hold a commemoration service where we light a candle and pray for those dear to us, to thank God for their lives well lived. In all these services we are strengthened in the knowledge that God understands our grief. Jesus, at the death of his friend Lazarus was moved to tears. It shows us that God is alongside us, understands our tears and is full of compassion – He is our comfort. We also hold onto hope. We are reminded that Jesus is the resurrection and the life and that through rising from the dead He shows us that He has power over death, and He promises us a future without the pain of grief. In November we remember those, both known and unknown to us, who have departed. We remember to give thanks for their love, their faithfulness and, for so many, their sacrifice. ### A reading from the Epistle to the Hebrews.

For Christ did not enter a sanctuary made with human hands that was only a copy of the true one; he entered heaven itself, now to appear for us in God's presence. Nor did he enter heaven to offer himself again and again, the way the high priest enters the Most Holy Place every year with blood that is not his own. Otherwise Christ would have had to suffer many times since the creation of the world. But he has appeared once for all at the culmination of the ages to do away with sin by the sacrifice of himself. Just as people are destined to die once, and after that to face judgment, so Christ was sacrificed once to take away the sins of many; and he will appear a second time, not to bear sin, but to bring salvation to those who are waiting for him.

This year I was moved on reading the following post on Facebook from such a young person who clearly understands the meaning and importance of the day.


Joshua Dyer (aged 14) was tasked at school to write a poem for Remembrance Day. An hour later (without any help) he produced this..

### Ribbon of Poppies at St Mary's

We first created our ribbon of poppies display in 2019, with it on display outside our scout centre. In 2020 we relocated it to the Wistaston Memorial Hall, in the centre of the village.

For 2021 we decided to take it a step further and produce an even bigger display to go up at St. Mary's Church, Wistaston. The display, made from over 5,000 plastic bottle ends, was first started back in January 2021 as we asked people to collect their bottle ends for us. Each week the bottles were emptied from the collection bin and spray painted red to resemble the poppy. Then, in October the work started to assemble the display by attaching the bottle ends to chicken wire, with buttons used to reassemble the centre of the poppy.

A big thank you to all of our Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Young Leaders, Leaders and parents who helped us to create the wonderful display, it simply wouldn't have been possible without you!

On their 100 year anniversary, we'd like to thank The Royal British Legion for all the work they have and will continue to do in supporting our veterans and currently serving personnel who have given up so much for their country. We hope our display is a fitting tribute to them and hope you can donate any spare money you have.
