Mike writes... October 2018



Dear Friends,

The season of Harvest is upon us once again this year. A time to be humbled with regard to how good God is to us and, at least in this country, be thankful for the bounty that is given to us.

I say humbled because I can never really find the right words to thank God for his goodness and also humbled because I'm reminded how much food we have in our country - step into any supermarket to see the vast array of foods available from both local and abroad. It no longer matters whether something happens to be in season as it's available all year round! So what should our response to God at Harvest Time be?

As a Christian I am always keen to see what I can discover in the Bible as through this we can see God's actions, God's words and God's peoples' reaction to his goodness. For those in Biblical times, the harvest was a most important event. The gathering of things planted, a natural time of reaping in joy what has been sown and produced during the year.

Whilst looking through the Bible, with Harvest in mind, I came across this from a book in the Old Testament, Leviticus, this book is to do with law, rules and regulations and it says this about the Harvest:

"When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and for the foreigner residing among you. I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 23.22

This verse reminds me of the other dimension to Harvest and that is of fairness, justice and charity. What a fantastic practical example we have in Leviticus of showing concern for those in need and those who are powerless. If we are not mindful of this side of Harvest, or we forget that there are those in need in this country and around the world, then we lose the true meaning of Harvest. That is of God's care and provision for ALL people in this world that we all share.

As a church we distribute the Harvest gifts we receive to St Luke's Hospice and the Crewe and Nantwich Food Banks. Any money given (including the collection at the Harvest Lunch) is split between the Chester Agricultural Chaplaincy and an international charity helping people in disaster or famine. Most of us may not have a field to harvest, but we can do good with what we do have.

Remembrance Sunday 11.11.18 - 100 Years On...

There But Not There

As I'm sure you know, this Remembrance Sunday, which falls on 11 November, commemorates the centenary of end of World War 1 (WW1). Sixteen men from Wistaston were killed during the conflicts of WW1 and in 2014 we had a special service at St Mary's to commemorate the centenary of the beginning of WW1 at which the eighteen names were read out and remembered. For Remembrance 2018 we have secured a grant from the Armed Forces Covenant Trust to buy 6 transparent 'silhouettes' of military figures, this is part of a nation-wide art installation to remember the fallen of the First World War. It is called 'There But Not There". We will be using the 'silhouettes' at our Remembrance Sunday Service on 11th November at 10:40am and inviting schools and the community to come into church around that time to reflect.

As part of the Centenary Year we are launching a War Memorial Project. This project will give safer access for all to the War Memorial in the churchyard at St Mary's with new paths, a safer area to view the memorial and lay wreaths with a railing and a better paved area around the memorial. We are working in partnership with Wistaston and Rope Parish Councils and we are holding an information evening, with the 'silhouettes', on Saturday 10 November at 7pm, in the Church Hall when you can view the plans and see how you can get involved. Church Flowers



Would you like to place some flowers on the Altar in memory of a loved one or for a special anniversary?

Would you like to attend a workshop (in 2019) on flower arranging for Church?

Some hints and tips on flower arranging:-

- 1. Remove dead flower heads and wash out the vases.
- 2. Prepare all your flowers by removing all but 2 or 3 leaves at the top of the stems.
- 3. Cut the bottom of the stems at an angle this way they can take up more water. (This can be done at home in advance to save time).
- 4. Divide the flowers into 2 equal bunches. Then arrange them in the vases with tall flowers at the back, medium ones on the next row and short stemmed ones at the front. Any gaps can be filled with greenery from the garden (or Churchyard), e.g. Laurel, Fatsia, Hebe.
