This year shoeboxes from the UK were sent to Albania, Belarus, Bosnia, Central Asia, Latvia, Liberia, Lithuania, Macedonia, the Middle East, Romania, Serbia, Swaziland, Ukraine and Zambia.

Together you packed an amazing 900,008 shoeboxes, meaning hundreds of thousands of children received a gift to remember. 18,575 of these shoeboxes were sent to refugee children passing through camps in Macedonia.

Thank you for partnering with Operation Christmas Child in 2015 to share God's love in a tangible way with children across the world over the Christmas season.





Ken writes... April 2016



Dear friends,

Easter Day may have passed once more but the season continues taking us forward to the Ascension and Pentecost. As we are reminded at the Lord's Supper when we proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The faithful know that every year is the same – the same joyous shout, Christ is risen!" What is our joy but that realisation of the Resurrection Joy banished forever the sound of that thudding stone enclosing our Lord's crucified body.

And yet, each year we know the story is not completed. In this world our alleluias can be drowned by other shouts, shouts of war, hatred, of fear, pain or confusion.

Relationships, between parents and children, spouses and friends, will still founder and break.

People still die, our close loved ones, and many others lost to mortality in disaster, conflict, famine and drought.

We still get anxious. Our hearts still get sick, whether from physical ailments or from the burdens of the heart and mind.

Dictators still rise and fall, and new ones rise up to take their place. Evil intent can be found in every land. Wars and violence still stalk us.

BUT from where will our help come? St Paul's letter to the Colossians urges us "set your minds on things that are above, not that are on earth."

Yet every year Easter arrives but the material world's idea of Easter has been with us in the temples of secularism since well before we began our Lenten journey but that is certainly a different story of instant satisfaction and the cult of "Me-ness".

Every year we in faith, hope and love joyously proclaim:

"Alleluia! Christ is risen!" for despite living a mortal life in this world's reality we hold to the greater reality of this day. We will go on living and loving, learning and yearning, praying and praising the God of all with Jesus our master, teacher and friend beside us because of this day.

And Christ will come again. It's that mysterious feeling of already and not yet.

When attempting to come to terms with the change from this mortal life to the eternal we are the Easter people whose Hope is in the promises of God in Christ. To quote Robert Bp of Exeter, (formerly Bp of Stockport)

"Resurrection is not just a doctrine but a reality to be lived each day. It requires much effort, imagination and practice WE are challenged not just to remember the events of Easter but to be transformed by them.

Have you got a toddler or pre-schooler and a few hours to fill on a Wednesday morning? Then why not come and join us at Stepping


