

Mike writes... Trinity 2015



Symbols are a very important part of our daily lives. What is it they say? "A picture can paint a thousand words". We take so many symbols for granted day by day as we go through our daily lives. Some are there to warn us of danger or hazards and others are there to give us

information. I guess the biggest use of symbols in place of words is on the roads, drivers will know (or at least should know!) from a sign just what speed they can safely do, be informed of a hazard, or merely be told if there is a place of historic interest nearby. All of these, and many other non road symbols, help us in our daily lives. Quite simply symbols replace the need for a lot of words or even help when there may not be the correct words to display.

I wonder what you see when you look at the symbol above? It is one of the most commonly used symbols to represent the Trinity, that is God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three Persons, One God. The Trinity is one of the great mysteries of our Christian faith - as human beings we struggle to take in the enormity of God, that

God can be three coexisting persons is a struggle for us to

take in. In fact, many theologians and preachers (myself included!) have struggled over the centuries to find the right words to inform people of the nature of the Trinity as they say, "Much ink has

been spilt". I have often come down to using something visual like: a tripod, one tripod but three legs that make it work, or, an egg, we speak of an egg yet it is made up of a shell, white and yoke! You begin to get the picture. When we see something, when we can visualise something, when we see a symbol, it can point us in the right direction to understanding things.

So take a fresh look at the symbol above, reflect on the nature of God as Trinity and upon the enormity of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit and then be amazed! Amazed that this God whom we have just reflected upon, who is out of our thought register, whom we struggle to fit into our worldview, is the same God who created and loves you. Wow!!

6 top tips for reading the Bible

The Bible isn't an easy book to read, but it's worth sticking at, said theologian Dr Paula Gooder. Speaking at the Christian Resources Exhibition at London's ExCel Centre, Dr Gooder said, 'The Bible can seem



overwhelming, boring and difficult, but a few basic tips can help you understand it more straightforwardly.'

Dr Gooder's 6 top tips for reading the Bible

- 1. Understand the historical context in which the Bible is written. Even the newest bits are 2,000 years old. So start asking yourself questions about it and Google the answers.
- 2. Read things in context. It's easy to take verses, or sometimes whole stories, out of context, by reading them by themselves.
- 3. Read what's actually there, rather than what you think might be there. This is particularly true for famous verses. So slow it down and chew it over.
- 4. We all bring our own experiences to the Bible. So, it's really helpful to read the Bible with other people, either in a home group or a prayer triplet, to gain other people's perspective on what they think the Bible says.
- 5. Don't read it from start to finish like a novel. It isn't one.



Start with the bits that you can get on with: Mark might be more interesting to you than Hebrews, Genesis more so than Leviticus.

6. And finally, don't beat yourself up if you're struggling. The Bible can be a difficult book, but it doesn't have to be. If you keep going you will get a revelation!
