




Frank reflects upon 60 Years of Ordained Ministry



Sixty years ago, on Trinity Sunday, 10th June 1954 I was ordained a priest. That's a long time since my potty training! - short for Post Ordination Training.

So what's been learnt through all those years?

First and foremost that you can only take a share in God's work

by relying on God's strength, and guidance. Step out in faith, he will challenge and surprise you.

From the start mine was a ministry of renewal. The surprise was how much of it involved the renewal buildings. St. Peter's Mission church, Derby End, Dudley. The church hall had to be rebuilt. the church totally refurbished. ΑII

completed and paid for in three years.

Then in 1960, Vicar of my first parish, The Good Shepherd, West Bromwich, a time of wholesale Urban Redevelopment. To fit in, it became necessary for us to amalgamate two parishes, demolish two churches, two

church halls and one vicarage, then build a new church and hall in the centre of the new Parish. All this took nine years to complete.

Then it was back from the new to the old. St. Leonard's Bilston. A 1000 seater ornate Georgian building which required total refurbishment and the removal

and recasting of the peal of eight bells. Also a new house for one of the Curates, and a new Church Primary School.

Also the establishment of a united Church with the Methodists on a large new Housing Estate. It was one congregation which shared in the C of E Holy Communion, and the Methodist Sunday Service, on

alternate Sundays.

After 25 years in the 'Black Country' came a country parish, St. Werburgh's, Hanbury. The urgent job there was to stop the stone window frames from falling on the worshippers, the church tower from collapsing, and to restore the fading murals on the

chancel and sanctuary walls. In my last parish, St. Mark's Basford Newcastle, we only had to build a new Vicarage. The epilogue was to create a much needed permanent Chapel in the Douglas Macmillan Hospice, Stoke-on-Trent.

There is no boasting intended here, simply a statement of how things developed. Jesus said. 'You can do nothing without me.' Nothing that will last. St. Paul was right when he wrote. 'We have nothing to boast about before God.' It takes God's strength to do God's work. What we learn is that Jesus always enables us when we have faith and trust in him. Not only through individuals but through Congregations and Church

Fellowships working together as the Body of Christ, reaching out to share God's grace, his love and fellowship in all sorts of ways.

Experience teaches that it is not always plain sailing. Looking back, there have been setbacks. One that was an especially deep crisis when I all but gave up my Ministry. Then it was that I learned that even when you give up on God, he never gives up on you. The poem, 'Footsteps' is true, there are times when God carries you, but there are also times when, so to speak, he seeks to give you a kick start! Another thing realised retrospect, it that it was when I

relied on my own strength and judgment, things went wrong. Progress came with Jesus in charge.

The only true peace that can come to this world is the peace of God. 'My peace I give to you' Jesus said. There really is no other. 'I am the way, the truth and the light' he told us, and he is so right. 'All things come from you O Lord, and of your own do we give you.'

We have no reason to boast, what we do have is every reason to give praise and thanksgiving. To God for all that he does. To so many people, to those in the past, and to those still us, whose inspiration, love and friendship, means so much to us. Those who, as we think of them, and all that they mean to us, bring tears of joy and thanksgiving.

Well there won't be another sixty years ahead for us oldies to look forward to. Just death, and maybe Heaven! But surely as Christians, nothing to fear. Having nothing to boast about, no glowing CV to present to God, we merit no reward, but our Father's love and mercy, in which we can have total faith and trust. There is that saying about passing through the gate into a New Year. Surely it applies to death also. As you pass through that gate, put your hand into the hand of God, it will be to you better than a lighted path or a known way.

This will incorporate the annual service for the Cheshire Regimental Association, which is usually held at this time, but with a special focus on the centenary of the outbreak of the War, and the Cheshire Regiment's involvement in it. The Cheshire Regiment, of course, recruited from across the County of Cheshire, which is essentially the area of the Diocese.

"Yes" to Women Bishops!

The Church of England General Synod has now (14 July) given its final approval for women to become bishops in the Church of England. The vote on the measure was carried by the required two-thirds majority in the three constituent Houses – of Bishops, Clergy and Laity.

The voting results were as follows:

House of Bishops: yes 37; no 2; abstentions 1 House of Clergy: yes 162; no 25; abstentions 4 House of Laity: yes 152; no 45; abstentions 5

This means the first woman bishop could potentially be appointed by the end of the year.
