Revd Mike writes...

Dear friends,

Over the past few weeks, we have begun to see shortages in the supermarkets with spaces appearing on the shelves where food would normally be. It's quite surprising when you see it as we are so used to seeing full shelves all the time. We have become accustomed to having food from all around the world, available all the time, in season and out. Perhaps the shortages we are experiencing are a timely reminder that, although we often like to feel we are in control of everything, we're not. The pandemic, and the ongoing crisis following it, are a witness to that.

Harvest Time, in years past, when a village relied upon what was gathered in to sustain them through coming year, was a time of celebration or concern. If the harvest was good, life would be good for the coming year, if it wasn't, then there would be shortages. For some people around the world there is still a real and tangible reliance upon what is gathered in at Harvest Time. For some, if the harvest fails, there is no Plan B, famine and starvation will follow, lives will be lost.

No wonder a successful harvest leads to a celebration, a celebration that continues today, a time to thank God, a celebration that should remind us of how fortunate we are and to remember others who are suffering at this time.

The gifts of food given this year will be shared between the local Food Banks, St Luke's Hospice and other local charities.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 6.25-33

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. **Glory to you O Lord.**

'Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?

'And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you — you of little faith? So do not worry, saying, "What shall we eat?" or "What shall we drink?" or "What shall we wear?" For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**



Global Images of Christ: Challenging Perceptions

opened to invited guests at a special event held at Chester Cathedral on Thursday 23 September.

The exhibition, made up of over 50 paintings, African and Chinese sculptures, and orthodox icons, aims to challenge the Western depiction of Jesus Christ and his followers. It opens to the public on Saturday 25 September and runs until the end of October.

The central piece in the exhibition is Lorna May Wadsworth's depiction of the Last Supper, the final meal that Jesus shared with his apostles in Jerusalem before his crucifixion. Wadsworth portrays Jesus as a black man and worked with Jamaican-born fashion model, Tafari Hinds who modelled for the representation. Her composition is based on the late 15th-century mural painting by Italian artist Leonardo da Vinci.



Diocesan Inclusion Officer, the Revd Vanessa Layfield says: "The Last Supper image of a black Christ may be shocking to some, but why? One might argue that an image of a white Christ is just as dishonest as an image of a black Christ, for Christ was neither black nor white, but a brown Middle Eastern Jew."

Global Images of Christ: Challenging Perceptions is open Monday – Saturday 10am – 6pm, Sunday 12 Noon – 5pm from Saturday 25 September to Saturday 30 October.
