Mike writes... December 2017



Dear Friends.

The constant refrain of Christmas, in carols and readings, is that God is with us. In whatever situations you find yourself this Christmas, God is with you - you need only turn to him and ask to know his presence.

Archbishop Justin Welby.

At the centre of Christmas is the Christ Child, Jesus, a baby born into poverty whose influence is still felt in the world today some 2000 years later. What is it about the birth of this child that could have such a profound effect on the world, then and now Archbishop Justin reminds of perhaps the main reason, that he is **God With Us**.

These three words, words which we have no doubt heard before many times, have in them such profound significance. God With Us. For centuries God had tried to connect with his people, to bring them home, to restore a broken relationship, to remind them of his fatherly goodness and his love for them. It seems as though on each occasion his people didn't listen and the story of the people of Israel in the Old Testament tells us of this. The same story can also be seen as a metaphor for our own lives were God seeks to speak to us, but we fail to listen, fail to act as he would want us to. The significance of Jesus being born was this: God had come among his people, as a human, as God, as God With Us.

We celebrate this afresh each year at

Christmastime and I invite you to join with me this Christmas to celebrate **God With Us**, you will find all our special Christmas Services on the back page of this magazine and on our website.

The work I did in Nepal by Charlotte Rhodes

As I sit writing this article, it is coming up to two months since I left Nepal. The time has flown by and when I flick through my diary, the emotions, thoughts and feelings are quickly blurring into one. Last time I shared with you a blog I had written for Raleigh, and this time I thought I would speak a little about the projects and work I completed in our village. You all generously contributed to my fundraising target, and I know if I were you, I would like to know it was put to good use.

Our project focused 'livelihoods', an area that aims to empower those with businesses through encouraging diversification and therefore increasing the money they can earn. Within my village this was mostly farming, usually vegetables and occasionally livestock such as chicken farms. We worked hard, and managed to achieve a lot in three different areas - infrastructure, training and community integration & cultural exchange.

Infrastructure created the most obvious change in the community. We supported 15 families with large projects, these included; 6 polytunnels, 2 plastic ponds and 7 live-stock shed improvements. The plastic ponds combats an all too common occurrence -water shortages. Nepal is affected heavily by climate change, it is in the belt of countries effected by monsoons, which are becoming more erratic, meanwhile, the Himalayas are situated here and the ice caps are melting. The changes in when water arrives in the village means (despite the tremendous amount of water which arrived during my time in Nepal) there are shortages in the winter. These ponds allow homes with no access to springs to store water for irrigation and to grow vegetables which are a high-value crop. Polytunnels and shed improvements allow diversification of their livelihoods with offseason farming and animal rearing.

We completed a seed distribution programme, giving high-value cauliflower seeds to all households who expressed an interest - this initial outlay was too much for most households and our seed distribution and subsequent crops allow a year on year profit increase. Alongside these programmes, we completed training that focused on areas the villagers were concerned about. This included climate change (lots don't believe it exists as Nepal is one of the lowest emitters), sapling transplantation, how to plan for business concerns and shed improvements. Sustainability is imperative and so providing the skills, and the materials will be much more useful for long term development.

We had many community days, from promoting International Youth Day with a sports day for kids, to 'Porridge Day' where people could try a western delicacy! We finished our time in the community with our Krishi Mela (Agri-festival) which involved lots of Nepali food and dance!

As well as these, we also had a panel of agricultural experts for the community to pose questions to and a 'Dragons Den' competition. The winner plans to turn three plastic ponds into a fish farm!

I could go on and on - I loved my time in Ghanti Khola, I miss it dearly, and only now when I sit and reflect do I realise how much of a difference we really made.

forefront of research into diabetes.

Emma Horne, 15, was invited to St Mary's Hospital after she helped raise £5,000 for Diabetes UK in her role as Wistaston Rose Queen.

They met Dr Jenny Myers, who is

leading ground-breaking research supported by Diabetes UK, to help mothers-to-be with diabetes.

Dr Myers and the team at University of Manchester and Saint Mary's Hospital gave the Horne family a tour of the clinic and laboratory where their research is taking place.

Emma said: "I chose to support Diabetes UK because we not only have some close friends who have diabetes but my step-sister, Laura, developed Type 1 diabetes 10 years ago after the birth of her first child, and then last year my dad found he was at risk of Type 2. "We wanted the money we raised to go towards Dr Myers' research because Laura gave birth to her second child in August and experienced difficulties which were connected to her diabetes. "It was great to come and see Dr Myers' work and learn how it will help women with diabetes and their babies in the future."
